Aloha Neighbors!

This year's budget surplus helped to support small businesses, keiki, kupuna, and our residents. It also increased affordable housing and rental programs to benefit both actual and potential homeless, increased the minimum wage to \$18 by 2028, made permanent a refundable income tax credit, and

even provided eligible residents an up-to-\$300 tax rebate.



Legislation also supported law enforcement, bolstered rehabilitation and drug treatment programs, helped end

homelessness, and made progress on reducing excessive noise. Tens of millions will also go to our district schools, Waikiki Beach restoration, street improvements in Central Kakaako and the safe crosswalk and dog park at Kolowalu Park. Looking ahead, we also funded sea level rise planning for our coastal district (see this and more on the district map inside).

YOUR INPUT MATTERS: 2021 ANNUAL SURVEY RESULTS - YOUR PRIORITIES, OUR ACTIONS

Since taking office Sen Moriwaki sends out the annual survey to gather input on issues of greatest concern—your priorities—to take action on legislation and programs. What follows are your priorities and our actions.

PRIORITY - ATTACKING CRIME

More law enforcement funding and staffing
Harsher penalties for violators
Expand citizen engagement
Geographically restrict repeat offenders
We have adequate law enforcement

OUR ACTIONS

- · Created Statewide Law Enforcement Dept of focus on public safety
- Opposed court's automatic release of non-violent offenders
- Increased funding for enforcement at Ala Wai and other small boat harbors
- Worked with HPD and McCully businesses to create security watch
- Supported HPD in community policing in Waikiki, McCully and Kakaako
- Working with City to impose geographic restrictions ('Safe & Sound')



To address growing burglaries and breaks-in of churches & businesses Sharon called together law enforcement, the state and city directors of homelessness, and community members to discuss ways to bring the offenders to justice.

PRIORITY - ENDING HOMELESSNESS



OUR ACTIONS

- Established permanent and independent State Office of Homelessness and Housing Solutions
- Established program for inmate re-entry so they don't find their way to homeless camp
- Funded Ohana Zones for temporary and permanent shelters and wrap-around services
- Funded homeless triage center to provide one-stop center for homeless services and housing
- Earmarked \$1 billion for low income and Hawaiian Homes housing
- Increased incentives for housing assistance to low-income households to prevent homelessness
- Funded \$300 million for infrastructure development to build more rental housing
- Established "Safe Spaces for Youth" program for homeless youth

Senator Moriwaki invited state, city and non-profit leaders and experts to join in ending homelessness. The End Homelessness Group spent many hours resulting in creating major state legislation and state & city funding committed to ending homelessness. Group continues to work on ending homelessness

PRIORITY - SEA LEVEL RISE RESILIENCY



OUR ACTIONS


- Funded \$400,000 to develop a sea level rise resiliency plan for Waikiki
- Authorizes funds for the Waikiki Special Improvement district to be used for environmental improvements and community benefits not only economic development
- Funded \$1.85 million for Waikiki Beach improvements



Sharon convened a group to work on the sea level rise resiliency plan for Waikiki which included residents, the Waikiki Improvement Assn., the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development, and the University of Hawaii.

PRIORITY - PRESERVE KAKAAKO MAKAI

Follow the master plan protecting open spaces
Develop the area as an extension of Ala Moana Park
Subject development to public discussions
Change the law to allow high rise residential development



OUR ACTIONS

- Voted against bill to allow 400' residential towers on Makai land; legislation blocked for two consecutive
 years, with Attorney General opinion advising bill is unconstitutional "special legislation"
- Introduced resolution calling for alternatives to dense, residential high-rises on Makai land
- Continue to work with the Hawaii Community Development Authority to urge landowners to work with community

LEGISLATION THAT AFFECTS OUR COMMUNITY



Caring for Kupuna

As co-convener of the Kupuna Caucus, Sharon supported measures that safeguard our seniors who are living in care homes by expanding the Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program. The legislature also prioritized aging in place by appropriating over \$10 million to the Kupuna Care and Caregivers programs to help those in need and those who care for them. The budget also includes \$1.5 million for Aging and Disability Resources Centers that provides programs and services to Kupuna. Other successes for the Kupuna Caucus include extending the renewal period from two years to four years for drivers licensees who are 72 years of age or older but younger than 80 and establish a statewide retirement savings program for small, private employers.

Act 167 added a State CHIEF DATA OFFICER AND A DATA TASK FORCE to develop, implement, and manage statewide data policies, procedures, and standards to facilitate data sharing across state agencies

Building Affordable Housing

As a member of the housing committee, Senator Moriwaki worked with Chair Stanley Chang, and House Chair and Vice-Chair Nadine Nakamura and Troy Hashimoto on measures that increase the utilization of Housing Choice Vouchers, the "Yes In My Backyard" bill creating a statewide working group on affordable housing, and allowing the State to more efficiently allocate private activity bonds for housing-relating projects.

Reforming Government

We passed bills that are now law to improve government. Act 165 requires ethics training for all government officials, Act 283 prohibits fundraisers during the legislative session, Act 181 increases penalties for false campaign finance information, and funding for a white collar crime/anti-corruption unit in the office of the attorney general. Other bills improve government efficiency through technology.
